2020, it goes without saying, was a year for the history books. The pandemic impacted us all and, lasted longer than any of us anticipated. COVID-19 drastically disrupted our lives – but in doing so, created opportunities for innovation and creation.

When COVID-19 hit our community, we knew one thing at the GTHS; with thousands of pets and people relying on us for help, we had to find a safe and responsible way to continue to serve. Now more than ever.

In April and May of 2020, we re-wrote how we operate almost every aspect of our organization with safety being our paramount priority. Simultaneously, we witnessed our world changing. People found themselves unemployed, accessible spay/neuter surgeries became more difficult to obtain and pet owners were faced with the possibly of losing a beloved furry family member due to circumstances beyond their control.

In April of 2020 we launched our Pet Pantry program serving pet owners struggling to feed their pet. In June, we opened our Animal Hospital to provide spay/neuter surgeries to financially limited pet owners. In July, we revamped our Pet Sitter Course so that it could be accessed online and available from the safety of home. Finally, in August, we held the first of four on-site Rabies and Microchip Clinics. With these new programs, we worked to ensure that no pet was left behind during COVID-19.

This year has brought out the best in all of us. From our steadfast donors to our hardworking volunteers and our ever-supportive community members, we have risen to the challenge. Together as a team, we fixed over 1200 pets, we helped over 1100 homeless animals, we have delivered over 2200 lbs of food to pets in need and we have ensured 68 families could keep their pet during an emergency.

In 2020, because of you, our incredible supporters, hope and compassion was provided when it was needed most.



Pets help people in crisis

Let's be real. Most of us want to make 2020 a distant memory. In the world of animal welfare though, 2020 brought a lot of innovation, and for our charity, meaningful work for pets and people.

In March it was time to re-group. This was most apparent in the services that we offer to the animals and people in need. We quickly had to stop and say, how can we react to deliver food? How can we perform even more spay and neuter services, and what do we need to do to provide emergency medical care when a crisis strikes for a family who desperately needs to keep their pet?

Calls came in for food. We gathered donations and our incredible volunteers delivered over 2200 pounds of it to door-steps. Our Pet Pantry was born. People needed emergency boarding, either to keep their pet during an illness or to get through a new challenge. Our foster team stepped it up and opened their homes to any animals that needed a safe place to stay for awhile.

Sixty six emergency surgeries were performed for animals who had an accident or illness, coming from a home that simply couldn't afford the veterinary care.

When we talk about innovation, that's what happened in our Animal Hospital. We accelerated a program so that pet owners needing affordable spay and neuter services had access. One day a week was dedicated to fixing at least 20 community pets in our hospital.

With incredible eagerness and determination to help, our staff, volunteers and the community came together to help keep pets with their people when they needed them most. Thank you for making pet ownership a reality for so many. You have no idea the happiness you brought to so many homes. Be proud of your work in 2020. We most certainly are!

Driving for Hope; when donors come together, anything is possible

Our donors allowed our team to travel 12,000 km to and from northern Ontario communities. They brought 201 pets into new homes to start again. They made sure that any animal needing extra veterinary care could get there safely and comfortably. They are Pam Odam, Lynn March, Lynne Seawright and Teri Band.

This incredible team came together this year with contributions to purchase a brand-new community outreach vehicle. As Pam will tell you; Teamwork + Collaboration = Magic. And, that's exactly what happened. At a time when people were experiencing even more hardship, and animals, as a result, may have suffered more, this group of visionary donors stepped it up to help.

Thank you for bringing this amazing resource to the GTHS to better our ability to deliver our mission work. We are forever grateful to you!

With livelihoods affected, people in crisis and others falling ill, urgent help was needed to care for their pets in times of need.


The phones were ringing off the hook for help.

In the spring of 2020, the Animal Hospital quickly adapted. By July, the Hospital had opened up its services to one public spay and neuter clinic a week. Twenty animals per clinic were receiving this procedure at an affordable cost.

Access to Rabies vaccinations and micro-chips were provided in community clinics. Under the safest possible conditions, we figured out a way to continue to provide these essential wellness services to anyone who needed them. Moving forward, we are proud to share that the Animal Hospital will provide public services 4 times a week.



In April of 2020, the GTHS made the important decision to even further assist pets and their families in financially disadvantaged situations, to access spay and neuter, vaccination, microchip and parasite treatment. Gabriella, pictured here, took advantage of these services.

"I went to the humane society pretty overwhelmed, because I couldn't get my cat fixed through my vets," Gabriella said. "I wasn't able to get it taken care of before she went into heat. I do have a disability and I can't risk her injuring me while she's in heat." With support from donors like yourselves, Gabriella's cat was taken care of, which has helped her more than you know during the pandemic. "She's a family pet that we got to help me," she said. "I have a pain disorder, so that limits how much I can get out and about. She's brought a lot of comfort to me." Thank you for generously helping pet owners like Gabriella to stay safe and enjoy the immense wellness benefits of pet ownership. You are an inspiration!



Forever Friends

Wills are often associated with division of property, naming an executor, and assigning trustees who will manage your assets. As the current law states, pets are considered personal property and as such, it is good practice to ensure your pets are well looked after by including them in your Will. We all want the very best for our beloved pets and making sure that you outline clear instructions regarding their care is a great way to give you peace of mind. They are members of your family, after all!

Leaving your pets out of your Will means that they may end up in a shelter; it is not safe to assume that a relative or friend will take them into their care without a formal agreement. Even if informal verbal arrangements are made, there is a high likelihood that messages can get crossed and details forgotten. Therefore, it is best to work with a legal professional when you are ready to write your Will.
